CELEBRATING THE REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENTS OF VOLUNTEERS

On Tuesday, April 20th, Volunteer Fairfax, together with the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, celebrates 149 nominees, 11 winners, and 10 Community Champions in its second Virtual Awards Program. Now celebrating its 30th year, the 2022 Fairfax County Volunteer Service Awards ceremony highlights the remarkable achievements of volunteers in several distinct award categories.

The Volunteer Service Awards recognize the work of volunteers in 2021, a year of recovery and adjustment for so many in our community due to COVID-19. And yet, as we see in tough times, there are helpers - those who answered the call to support the community.

It was a year of innovating - of finding new volunteer experiences that were not only safe, but purposeful and impactful. When we realized the volunteering public was eager to take on these re-imagined volunteer roles, whether virtual, distanced or a hybrid, we thankfully found ourselves breaking historical records for participation in volunteer activities as a result.

Carla Claure, the Lee District Community Champion, demonstrated exceptional leadership as she worked tirelessly to make sure her community had weekly, occurring food distributions which provides food for over 200 families. She also worked closely with the Health Department to create COVID-19 vaccine clinics and to register over 600 residents for vaccine appointments.

The COVID-19 pandemic increased residents' desire for outdoor recreation and activities close to home. Jim Albright and the Annandale Greenway Team identified and highlighted opportunities in the Mason District for recreation, discovery, history, environmental habitat, etc. – that already was there, but often overlooked.

Through the tremendous work of Fairfax County nonprofit partners, government agencies, and the volunteer leaders who support them, volunteers recognized in the #StrongerTogether category are those who kept showing up to support the people and causes they care about. In challenging times and at the risk of personal health, they displayed kindness and care to others, showing the entire community that good really does connect us all. Charitable deeds large and small, from a prescription delivered for an elderly neighbor to a garden planted for the community to enjoy to a meal delivered for one or many – each of these acts binds our community and displays the deep caring and heart of this community.

While we are inspired by the individuals within these pages, we know that it takes each and every one of us doing our part to show that how we are connected, even in the darkest of times. We want to commend and thank you for elevating the quality of life in Fairfax County through volunteerism even in the face of the unfathomable past two years.







📭 ince 2015, Loren has been an integral part of the Literacy O Council of Northern Virginia's positive impact on the lives of English learners in Fairfax County. Serving learners from many different nationalities, cultures, and backgrounds, Loren creates a supportive community by strengthening students' sense of belonging and confidence to engage with wider society.

Her students praise her dedication and note her passion for teaching. One student noted that she responds to questions, explains English easily and above all, her voice was good to hear. Another student noted that Teacher Loren responds to any questions promptly, in and out of the classroom. "Also, if the lesson has not been understood... even by just one student, she

insists on explaining the course until everyone understands." Loren spends countless hours preparing for her Beginning English classes. She teaches in the mornings, and then spends the afternoons planning lessons.



Frank was the impressive key volunteer leader of Fairfax County's 65 large-scale emergency food distribution events organized to ease the economic and food insecurity impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The events involved hundreds of volunteers of the Fairfax County Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and other organizations. Frank formed the initial response structure in May 2020 and ensured its success over the next year. He demonstrated endless passion and energy to address the challenges of each event, ensuring the delivery of more than four million pounds of food (equal to 120,000 weeks of food to residents.)

Frank's skills as an experienced event planner, innovator, team collaborator and boots-on-the-ground leader proved to be invaluable. He worked closely with County officials and excelled at collaborating with Supervisors' offices, volunteer groups, and Fairfax County Police to conduct detailed assessments

of potential distribution sites, conduct site walk-throughs with stakeholders, anticipate issues, and develop detailed plans and event briefings. To execute food distribution, Frank coordinated with non-profits, houses of worship, and county agencies to determine volunteer needs, set up a volunteer sign-up system, and recruit and manage volunteers. The event operations required managing traffic flow (walk-up and drivethrough), minimizing disruptions to surrounding communities, and ensuring volunteer safety and site security.

Frank inspired others with his leadership. He cross-trained key volunteers who proceeded to organize 10 small-scale food distribution events, thereby expanding the impact to the community. As they grew comfortable in their leadership roles, the volunteers subsequently partnered with the Fairfax County Animal Shelter to distribute more than over 70,000 pounds of pet food.

FAIRFAX MASTER NATURALISTS



hroughout the pandemic, the Fairfax Master Naturalist (FMN) chapter of the Virginia Master Naturalist Program offered refuge —for volunteers and citizens alike — who were seeking "outdoor relief." By developing volunteers to assist with the beneficial management and preservation of natural resources and natural areas in the County, FMN widens opportunities for residents to enjoy the great outdoors. Serving a variety of partner groups and institutions, in 2021 FMN supported more than 100 projects to preserve and protect Fairfax County natural resources and delivered 25% more volunteer hours than the prior year, for a total cost savings to its partners of \$538,732. FMN hosted two training opportunities during COVD for 40 Fairfax residents. The trainees met online weekly for two hours, and participated in sociallydistanced field trips. Graduates completed training eager to positively impact the natural environment. One recent graduate used knowledge gained during coursework to rally other Girl Scout volunteers,

educate the public on the matter of environmental sustainability and preserving nature, as well as earn her GS Gold Award. FMN partners with parks, nature centers, government agencies and other organizations committed to preserving nature in Fairfax County. Volunteers supported Plant NOVA Natives and Trees by enlisting the public to pull invasive plants, shrubs and trees and plant native ones. FMN's ongoing support includes marking native plants with special tags at retail nurseries, distributing brochures, writing articles, and supporting HOAs interested in pulling invasive vines. FMN also assisted National Capital PRISM and US Geological Survey in their efforts to identify and eradicate an invasive water chestnut species at several ponds in Fairfax County. Members continue to report water chestnut when observed at area bodies of water.

aurie has changed the face of Capital Caring Health's volunteer pediatric program through her dedication and leadership. She exemplifies how one volunteer can transform an entire program and while doing so, embrace many community members to join the volunteer workforce. Capital Caring Health marvels at how deeply Laurie's accomplishments have positively impacted Fairfax County.

Laurie developed a program and approach to providing hospice care to children that removes fear from the process. She does this by "memory making" with patients and families. Knowing how important a birthday is in the life of a family caring for a seriously ill child, Laurie began dressing in costumes to deliver birthday cakes and gifts. Her costume choices are endless - from Minnie Mouse to Princess Leia - and they always bring joy and laughter. Through her leadership, other volunteers have joined the cause, donning costumes of their own and delivering special gifts to other family members.

This innovative program has carried over to monthly initiatives for each pediatric family, culminating with The Elf Squad in December. Laurie chairs this large endeavor that provides gifts for our patients and their siblings. Last year, Laurie and her elves provided more than 200 gifts and delivered them in festive holiday costumers. Because of Laurie's energy and passion, Capital Caring Health was able to collect donations from the community to support this 100% volunteer-driven program.

mini is a community builder, organizer, and A advocate. She uses her titles of Miss Black DC 2020 and Miss Fairfax City 2021 to speak up for marginalized communities. During her time at George Mason University, Amini was a founding board member of the COVID Student Safety Corps. She also founded the Student Safety Advocacy Board, the Conflict-Free Campus Initiative, and GMU's first-ever delegation of the Model African Union.

In 2018 Amini started her own organization, Brains Then Beauty, an empowerment organization supporting personal and professional development. In the four years since its founding, the organization has provided almost 500 hours of community service as a group, helped pack more than 40,000 meals with partners, and raised \$10,000 in one night for local charitable causes. The group's activities include partnering with organizations such as Doorways For Women to collect donations and raise awareness for domestic violence; partnering with under-served schools to provide guidance and connect students with resources to seek higher education; and encouraging young women to step into their power by serving on executive boards and hosting an annual gathering of female leaders in Fairfax.

Organizations she has volunteered with include Brains Then Beauty, Volunteer Fairfax, Girls On The Run, Junior League, and Serve DC.

The Fairfax Medical Reserve Corps has grown from a six-member physician task force created in 2002 in response to anthrax attacks to more than 3,550 members today. Volunteers needn't have a medical/public health background, but they all share a passion for helping to keep their communities healthy and safe. Over the years, these local heroes have provided thousands of volunteer service hours to Fairfax County, supporting public health emergencies (such as measles, TB outbreaks and the Coronavirus Pandemic), responding to public health implications of severe weather incidents, and conducting educational and outreach activities.

Their dedicated service proved to be crucial throughout the COVID pandemic. In total, more than 1,450 Fairfax MRC volunteers donated over 65,000 hours in efforts to combat COVID-19, supporting the community's health and quality of life for an estimated

monetary value of \$1,896,700. The COVID-19 vaccination campaign was the largest, most important public health mission FMRC had ever supported, administering some 410,000 doses in Health Department clinics across the county. The Corps' team of 450 approved vaccinators was used as the state's future model for how to sufficiently scale up to meet the vaccination needs of communities throughout Virginia. In addition to working vaccination clinics and community testing FMRCvolunteers conducted events. community outreach, provided logistical support to inventory personal protective supported isolation equipment, quarantine efforts, and provided medical care in long-term care facilities. They even assisted voters at the polls by acting as infection prevention ambassadors.

aria is a registered nurse who uses her clinical nursing skills to help those who face health issues. Her ability to provide compassionate, kind, and generous care makes her a perfect hospice volunteer. Maria is a community connector and resource for the social workers at Capital Caring Health. When a social worker has a patient with limited financial resources, Maria is the go-to person. She is helpful and knowledgeable. Each week, Maria makes calls to patients to provide a touchpoint check- in. These calls target any health needs, such as refills on medications, pain levels, and supplies, but they also provide emotional support to the patient and their caregiver.

Sole caregivers are often completely exhausted; sometimes too tired to ask for what they need. Maria doesn't hesitate to make soups and other foods to bring to a caregiver. As their loved ones decline and subsequently die, Maria makes sure the caregivers don't feel alone. She attends to them every step of the way with a genuine compassion that comes naturally to her. Her support for patients extends beyond nursing; she often personally purchases Thanksgiving meals, birthday cakes, groceries, and dinners for patients in need. Capital Caring Health doesn't turn

anyone away based on inability to pay so Maria's generosity has directly impacted many families. Maria volunteers in two other efforts that also benefit our community. As a COVID vaccinator, she has bounced from working hours at Capital Caring Health to vaccination sites where she dresses in her cute scrubs to vaccinate children in the community. Maria also serves on the Board of Directors for Alice's Kids, where her knowledge and resources help children who need shoes, eyeglasses, books, school supplies and other important items.



PROGRAM



he Ombudsman Volunteer Program of NVLTCOP advocates for the highest quality of life and care for people receiving long-term care services. During the months in 2021 that volunteers had access to facilities (due to COVD-19), they volunteered 3,868 hours, provided 1,353 visits, helped ensure that 2,737 resident concerns were addressed, and advocated for systemic changes. Since the program's founding in 1985, Ombudsman volunteers have contributed 261,547 lifetime hours, representing a total value of \$7,621,473.

NVLTCOP's seven staff members serve a resident population that can exceed 12,000. Its volunteer program has allowed the NVLTCOP to expand its presence in the community. By committing to visiting the 137 facilities on a frequent basis, volunteers ensure that residents' concerns are heard and addressed at the facility level and the state and federal level.

The Ombudsman Volunteer Program navigated throughout the pandemic with patience, humor, grace, and an abundance

of compassion. In March 2020, LTC facilities closed to most visitors, including the ombudsmen volunteers. The volunteers took that opportunity to participate in ongoing training and communication. Many volunteers also kept in touch with their assigned facility staff and residents during the lockdown as a way to reassure them that services were available and that they still had an advocate.

After the COVID-19 visitation restrictions were lifted, 34 volunteers resumed visiting facilities, providing a friendly and caring presence for residents after a long, lonely year of isolation. Volunteers renewed their relationships and trust with residents (and their family and friends) and facility staff to advocate for improving the quality of life and care and empowerment of all residents. Additionally, volunteers attended 59 resident council and 15 family council meetings. Lastly, volunteers assisted NVLTCOP staff in training new volunteers with presentations and facility tours.
